Fan Pressing	A limited edition created during a defined issuance window when an eligible fan completes a qualifying purchase.
Studio Pressing	The canonical digital edition that remains available after limited editions conclude.
Ownership Verified Artist Access	An optional artist-controlled feature that enables experiences exclusively for verified owners of eligible Pressings.
Mint-on-purchase	A process in which an eligible Pressing is created when a qualifying purchase is completed.
Edition rules	The artist-defined conditions that govern supply, eligibility, transferability, access, and other edition behavior.
Transferability	Whether ownership of a Pressing may be transferred to another eligible owner.
Provenance	The recorded origin, issuance, ownership, and transfer context of a Pressing.
